Kindergarten Registration





Yearbook Reminder



Field Trip Consent Forms

All student field trip consent / permisson forms, (for all Grades K-8), are now required to be completed electronically - this applies to all field trips with or without a cost to them. Parents simply need to login to their student quick pay account and locate the form under the Field Trip heading. Once you select the field trip form to be completed, fill out the required information, then click the submit button. If there is a cost for the field trip, the charge will automatically be added to your child's account to be paid. Note: All fields on the consent/permission form must be fully completed or the form will not be submitted.

Fraser Health: Healthy Schools Message

Protect children from respiratory illnesses this winter:

Respiratory illnesses tend to increase as we spend more time indoors. Common colds, the flu and COVID-19 spread through tiny droplets as people who are sick breathe, talk, cough or sneeze. When other people touch these droplets and then their eyes, mouth, or nose before washing their hands they may become sick.

There are a handful of steps both children and adults can take to protect themselves and limit the spread of respiratoryillnesses:

- Wash your hands often with soap and water. Use alcohol-based sanitizer if soap and water is not available.
- Avoid touching your face, especially your eyes, mouth and nose.
- Cough and sneeze into your elbow.
- If you have symptoms, stay home and stay away from people at higher risk of serious illness.

Flu and COVID-19 vaccinations

The best way to protect others and reduce the risk of getting sick with the flu and COVID-19 is to get immunized. The flu and COVID-19 vaccines are safe, effective, and available for free to anyone aged six months and older.

It is much safer to get the vaccines than to get the illnesses. Register your children with the Get Vaccinated system so that you can be invited to book their vaccinations when they are due.




Student Quick Pay & Field Trip Permission Forms

To fill out a field trip form for your child on Student Quick Pay, please follow the steps below:


Open Chilliwack School District website. Click on "Parent/Community" then "SD33 Pay Online".



Dec. 1	World AIDS Day: Designated on December 1 every year since 1988, is an international day
	dedicated to raising awareness of the AIDS pandemic caused by the spread of HIV infection and
	mourning those who have died of the disease.
Dec. 2	International Day for the Abolition of Slavery: This day is held annually on December 2 to raise
	awareness of the atrocities of modern slavery. It is not to be confused with another UN day, the
	International Day for the Remembrance of the Slave Trade and its Abolition
Dec. 3	Advent: Advent marks a month-long period of preparation and anticipation for the birth of Jesus
	on Christmas Day; ends December 24 (Christian).
	International Day of Persons with Disabilities: Promoted by the UN, this day is to promote an
	understanding of disability issues and mobilize support for the dignity, rights, and well-being of
	persons with disabilities (international).
Dec. 5	International Volunteer Day for Economic and Social Development: This day, which is also known as
	International Volunteer Day (IVD), gives volunteers a chance to work together on projects and
	campaigns promoting their contributions to economic and social development at local, national
	and international levels (international).
Dec. 6	National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women: A day of remembrance of
	the murder of 14 young women at Polytechnique Montréal. It is about remembering those who
	have experienced gender-based violence and those who we have lost to it. It is also a time to take
	action and to work towards achieving a Canada free from gender-based violence (Canada).
Dec. 7	Hanukkah: Also known as the Jewish Festival of Lights or Feast of Dedication, Hanukkah is an eight-
	day Jewish holiday in memory of the rededication of the Holy Temple in Jerusalem; ends December
	15 (Jewish).
Dec. 8	Feast of the Immaculate Conception: The Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception is a celebration
D 10	of the belief in the Immaculate Conception of the Virgin Mary (Christian).
Dec. 10	Human Rights Day: A day to honour the UN General Assembly's adoption and proclamation, on
	December 10, 1948, of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR), the first global
D 10	enunciation of human rights (international).
Dec. 18	International Migrants Day: Declared by the UN, this is a day to honour the international
D 20	convention on the protection of the rights of migrants (international).
Dec. 20	International Human Solidarity Day: This is annually held on December 20 to celebrate unity in
	diversity. It also aims to remind people of the importance of solidarity in working towards
	eradicating poverty (international).

Dec. 24	Christmas Eve: Christmas Eve is the evening before Christmas which is often observed with a long
	meal, usually with family, sometimes accompanied by other celebrations such as midnight mass
	(Christian).
Dec. 25	Christmas Day: A holiday celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ. It is recognized as a public holiday in
	many nations around the world and is also celebrated secularly by many non-Christians (Christian).
Dec. 26	Boxing Day: The day after Christmas Day was traditionally celebrated as the day tradesmen and
	servants would receive gifts from their employers
Dec. 26	Kwanzaa: A celebration held in the United States and in other nations of the African diaspora in the
	Americas and lasts a week. The celebration honors African heritage in African-American culture
	and is observed from December 26 to January 1, culminating in a feast and gift-giving.



INCLEMENT WEATHER SCHOOL CLOSURE GUIDELINES

Information for Parents and Students



Inclement weather conditions such as freezing rain, significant snowfall or high wind can occur during the fall and winter months. In such conditions, decisions on the opening or closure of school district facilities are made by the Superintendent of Schools in consultation with management and supervisory staff who have checked first-hand on the driving conditions, walking/sidewalk conditions, and general condition of buildings and accessibility to sites. While service to students and parents is a priority and schools will be kept open as much as is reasonably possible, student and staff safety is the primary consideration.

In the event of extreme weather conditions, parents are urged to check the **School District website** www.sd33.bc.ca or tune into radio stations **STAR FM (98.3 FM)** or **JR COUNTRY (89.5 FM)**, to receive up-to-date information on school closures and information on bussing. Reports will start after 6:00 a.m. and will be repeated often. There is no need to call your school, the School District Office or the radio station.

When there is extreme weather and schools remain open, student attendance is the parent/guardians' decision.

A **Transportation Snow Plan** is in place for students who rely on travel by school bus and live in <u>higher elevations</u> such as Chilliwack Mountain, Little Mountain, Majuba Hill, Ryder Lake and some areas of Columbia Valley and the Eastern Hillsides. An announcement will be made should travel in these areas become challenging due to slippery road conditions.

How are District Sites and Road Conditions Assessed during Inclement Weather?

Beginning at approximately 2:00 a.m., a team of maintenance and transportation staff begin investigating road conditions and conditions at district sites. Unpredictable conditions can be a result of the varying elevations within Chilliwack. For this reason, road assessments take place in the following areas:

Rosedale, Popkum, Little Mountain and Chilliwack Mountain, Columbia Valley (to the U.S. Border), Chilliwack Lake Road (to Allison Pools), Promontory, Ryder Lake (to Look-Out Point), Prest Road, Marble Hill, Yarrow (including Majuba Hill), and Greendale.

District crews provide an estimated time that snow and ice will be cleared from parking lots, sidewalks and busses. The Manager of Transportation also consults with City of Chilliwack Maintenance Staff and the Fraser Valley Regional District (EMIL Anderson). Weather reports and storm warnings are taken into consideration for the day. Other concerns include fallen or low-lying trees, power failures, accidents and traffic flow. Sidewalks that have excessive snow due to snow removal off the streets are also a safety concern, especially along corridors where students would normally walk to school.

Decisions are also made based on weather conditions forecasted for the "whole day". If weather changes mid-day there is no way for us to bring students home early because in many cases both parents are working, or may not be home.

Once area assessments are complete, the Facilities/Transportation Team meet to compare their observations. A recommendation is then made to the Superintendent of Schools prior to 5:00 a.m.

How do we make a decision to announce a Snow Day?

Once a recommendation is received, the Superintendent of Schools makes a decision based on the information provided; taking into account the safety of students and staff as a primary concern.

A district announcement is immediately placed on the local radio stations, School District website and social media sites. Notification is also sent to staff, District partners, Community/NLC Coordinators, Daycares and Preschools.

<u>Snow Days are announced on a day-by-day basis only</u>. If inclement weather should continue for more than one day, a routine assessment will occur each day with recommendations brought forward prior to an announcement.

Should inclement weather occur over a weekend, Community School/NLC Coordinators and Principals at these sites are updated and notified of any closures so they may plan accordingly should they need to cancel rentals and re-schedule planned events. For this reason, Community School and NLC sites (or sites hosting significant events) are given priority for snow removal on weekends.

Principals should notify Facilities Staff of significant planned events (including weekend events) booked at their site so that snow removal crews can be scheduled accordingly.
